

#### **MUSIC AT 11....**

We certainly have many wonderful hymns in our book that we use every week, but hymns are still being written today and I think it is important that we use some of these in worship from time to time. The opening hymn Sunday is "When the Morning Stars Together" arranged by Jeremy Bankson. In the book of Job, God tells him that the angels and the morning stars sang and shouted together as the cornerstone of earth's foundation was laid. From the dawn of time - the song of praise was there. The text was written in 2013 and like a lot of hymns it is wedded to a tune from 1741! Jeremy Bankson is an active composer and is the Director of Music at the Prince of Peace Lutheran Church in Dublin Ohio.

John Fawcett the author of "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" was an English Baptist minister in Yorkshire when he received a call to a bigger and more prestigious church in London. After preaching his last sermon and loading his luggage on the wagons, he decided that he would rather stay with the folks in the smaller church, and wrote this hymn. In its first publication in 1782 it was called "Brotherly Love."

I have written about this hymn before and it bears repeating again. Sometimes we need to be more like Katherine Hankey. Many people sing this hymn vigorously but do little to go out and "tell the story" beyond the church walls. Hankey startled England by the unheard of thing of starting a Bible class for young working women in London. She also served as a nurse in South Africa, and turned over all proceeds from her writings to Christian missions. She certainly lived what she wrote.

#### **The Seven Last Words of Jesus**

The journey of Lent is the journey of Jesus to the cross. Taking on the frailty and mortality of human life, his humble obedience, his suffering and agony, and his extravagant sacrifice all bear witness to his unquenchable and everlasting love. Lent, in the tradition of the church, is the spiritual road in which we follow in Jesus' footsteps to Easter. This journey calls us to draw near to Christ on the cross and experience both divine awe and deep intimacy. Pastor Erik leads us in contemplating the words Jesus speaks from the cross to find the promise of hope and life that comes when the sun rises on the third day! ### **A Street Named for Gilbert Haven**

Street Names in Ocean City named for prominent Methodists

With Ocean City having been founded by four Methodist ministers it is no surprise that two of the streets are named Wesley and Asbury. Both streets are undoubtedly named for two of the luminaries of Methodist history. John Wesley, along with his brother, Charles, were the leading forces for the development of Methodism in 18th Century England. Francis Asbury was the great pioneering bishop that shaped American Methodism from his arrival on these shores in 1771 until his death in 1816. You can find images of the two Wesleys and Asbury, along with Thomas Coke who was the first bishop in American Methodism, over the main Central Avenue door.

What has also attracted my interest recently the names of Simpson Avenue and Haven Avenue. I have not seen any documentation supporting my theory and others may need to correct this but two prominent Methodist bishops in the mid-19th Century were Matthew Simpson and Gilbert Haven. I think it is likely that these avenues were named for them.

During Black History month I want to say a word about Gilbert Haven because he was one of the very few Methodist leaders who was an active abolitionist. He died in 1880, having served as bishop for eight years. He strongly supported the end of slavery, prohibition, women's suffrage and equality, and the holiness movement. "He was an ardent supporter of social and legal equality among the races, and even advocated racial amalgamation." (From *Historical Dictionary of Methodism,* edited by Charles Yrigoyen, Jr. and Susan E. Warrick, 1996, page 105.) He served as a chaplain in the Civil War and at one time was pastor of a church in Newark, New Jersey. The timing of his death and his support of prohibition, more than his efforts to end slavery, would likely have made his name be of interest to those who were laying out and naming the streets of Ocean City.

The Ronald McDonald House helps families with seriously ill children who are receiving medical treatment far from home by providing food, housing, and so much more. The Ronald McDonald House raises charitable revenue by recycling aluminum can tabs. Can tabs have significant value in the recycling industry, representing the purest form of aluminum. The aluminum that is donated to the Ronald McDonald House is taken to a local recycling station where it is weighed and cashed in by the pound.
